





Continue this course and enjoy yourselves as we head into the Fall.






# THE KEY TO A SUCCESSFULL AND ENJOYABLE OVERSEAS TOUR OF DUTY






CTMCS Raub and LTJG Bergman count laps as CTTCM Sinkbeil and CTAC Trigiano display that winning form.

(AKA THE GREEN MACHINE)



# "TRAINING TASKS"


Greetings from the Command Training Petty Officer. Since the last issue of the Quill, many changes have come about.

# DO I STAY OR DO I GO!?!

Now that the weather is nice, cool breezes on hot summer days. Memories of the blustery winter days have faded. The beach beacons.

"It's not so bad here"

Dreading a PCS transfer after FINALLY finding your own special niche within the command, or that special someone?

"I wonder if I could stay"

Don't know where to go next, or don't really care to go to one of the new duty stations offered?

"I think I'll stay"

For whatever reason you make the decision to extend your tour on board have I got a deal for you! Under the Overseas Tour Extention Incentives Program if you desire to extend your tour onboard for at least 12 months there are 3 incentive options available:

A. \$80.00 special pay per month for the duration of the extention

B. 30 days "Basket Leave"

C. 15 days leave plus round trip transportation to Philadelphia.

Keep in mind that extention requests are approved/disapproved based on current manning requirements, status of relief and most important, timeliness of request.


# UNIFORM TIPS

WOMEN TO WEAR SERVICE DRESS WHITE JUMPER. As you all remember, last SEP, CNO approved the jumper white uniform for E1-E6 females. The jumper is currently available in all uniform shops and may be worn when the Full/Service Dress White uniform is prescribed. Purchase of this uniform is at the individuals option until 1 Oct 93 when it becomes a mandatory uniform item. The Service Dress White Jumper (female) was designed to give the best fit and appearance to the Navy woman. Wearing of the man's Service Dress White Jumper is not authorized.

**Question:** Are men authorized to wear a bracelet while in uniform?

**Answer:** Yes. While in uniform, only one bracelet may be worn. Ankle bracelets are not authorized while in uniform. Bracelets should be black, gold or silver.





**Question:** How long after childbirth is the maternity uniform authorized?

**Answer:** Maternity uniforms are mandatory for all pregnant women in the Navy when the regular uniform no longer fits. This uniform is not authorized for wear after childbirth.

**Question:** Can men and women wear either the V-neck or crew neck undershirt with Summer Whites/Khaki?

Answer: Yes. Navy Uniform Regs state: "Undershirt: Made of white cotton or polyester/cotton. May be sleeveless and have a V-neck or crew neck." "Crew neck shirts must be worn with all uniforms aboard ship and in areas where industrial or fire hazards exists." Unless otherwise prescribed, it is implied that all personnel have the option to wear the V-neck or crew neck undershirt.






