



The Duty Preference Form has a significant role in determining future orders you will receive. It serves as a direct link between you and your detailer by letting him or her know of your duty desires. Also, it will inform the detailer of special interests/requests you may have for a specific program by stating that special interest/request in the remarks section of the form. In addition, by simply maintaining an up-to-date "Dupref" in your NMPC file, the detailer is made aware of your own interest in determining your own future orders and he/she will do the best they can to match your desires and the needs of the Navy. Without your input you are subject solely to the needs of the Navy.

Personnel on Diego Garcia may obtain the Dupref forms from their respective career counselors. The Dupref should be submitted, with the professional guidance of their career counselor, within three months after arriving on-island. Negotiations for follow-on orders commence 6-5 months prior to the member's projected rotation date (PRD). Therefore, your desires should be determined and made known to all concerned prior to negotiating.

With proper planning, guidance, and documentation you can play a part in the decision-making process for obtaining the duty of your choice, and it all begins with the Duty Preference Form. Talk to your Career Counselor.




was busying himself with adolesent games.

Well, here I am on Diego Garcia again. When I left in Jan 1980, I never thought I'd see this place again and at that time I didn't really want to see it again. But I was offered the opportunity to come here again for only 2 months, and here I am again.

In a lot of ways D.G. is still the same beautiful tropical island with it's sandy beaches, clear water, coral, coconuts, palm trees, and hot weather. But in other ways it's changed. There's a lot more people here, including females, Filipinos, and other civilians, but there's a lot less Seabees. From what I've seen at C site the females have helped to improve moral, and added a great deal of professionalism.

D.G. is also a lot busier now, with a lot more ships and planes coming and going. In 1979 we were lucky to get 2 or 3 planes per week from the Phillipines, (and none from Norfolk). And when a Navy ship pulled in, it was a big event. Everyone would go over to the lagoon side. Now I think the residents are somewhat relieved when the fleet departs.

The biggest change I've noticed has been the construction, and demolition

which has occured since I left. When I left BEQ 7 had been



completed, (in Sept. 1979) and BEO 8 was under construction, by the Seabees. Splendidville and BEQ's 9, 10, 11, and 12 did not exist. To the west of the post office (where BEQ's 9, 10, 11 and 12 are now) there were several corrugated metal buildings. which included the old chow hall (or "Reindeer Inn" as it was called), a bakery, an ice house, and other buildings for use by the Seabees. The building on the other side of the post office (in front of the new chow hall) was the package store. The new chow hall, is situated where the old softball field was located, and out behind that toward the lagoon were several seahuts, which were home for many, who were stationed here during the 1970's.

Behind the post office was a laundry room, weight room, and racquetball courts. And alas, the infamous "Diego Burger" is also gone.

Some other pleasent changes and additions include the Stars and Stripes book store, the satellite terminal for phone and television, and the United Seaman's Center. They've also attempted to beautify the downtown area, by the additions of those low white fences, and shrubbery.

But with all of the changes, and improvements, D.G. is still an isolated tour and the people stationed here are away from friends and loved ones. Mail is a very big morale booster, as we eagerly await to see if we've gotten any mail. One of the most depressing things here, is not to get any mail. To the people stationed here, I encourage you to write letters home, because I've found that the more letters you write, the more you'll receive. And those of you. who read this, and aren't fortunate enough to be here, remember those people who are here and write some letters, (and send packages). I know it will be greatly appreciated.




