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

CO'S COMMENTS

Naval Communications Station (NAVCOMM-STA) Diego Garcia, British Indian Ocean Territory, consisting of six officers and one hundred and thirty two enlisted men was commissioned on 20 March 1973 under the command of CDR Clyde E. Hamiltion, USN. The Royal Naval element was under command of LCDR Carter, RN. The commanding officer of Naval Mobile Construction Battalion Sixty Two was the island commander. In mid 1973 island commander responsibilities and duties were assumed by the CO, NAVCOMMSTA. In May 1974

a Security Group Department was added to the NAVCOMMSTA organization. The most recent change to the island organization was the establishment of the Naval Support Facility (NSF) on 1 October 1977. All NAVCOMMSTA personnel other than those specifically dedicated to communications functions were transferred to and formed the nucleus crew of NSF Diego Garcia.

The original purpose of the austere communications station was to provide a link in the U.S. communications network and to furnish improved communications support in the Indian Ocean for ships and aircraft owned and operated by the United States and the United Kingdom. The NAVCOMMSTA was jointly manned by U.S. and UK personnel until August 1982 when the last British communicator departed our Security Group Department.

Our first full period ship-shore termination was established with USS La Salle (AGF-3) on 27 May 1973. Today we have ship-shore terminations with USS Enterprise (CVN-65), USS Samuel Gompers (AD-37), USS Stump (DD-978) and USS Bainbridge (CGN-25). Initial naval communications from Diego Garcia were from an Air Transportable Communications Unit (ATCU). The ATCU resembled a modified railroad boxcar jammed full of various transmitters, receivers and associated equipment. A 300 acre Transmitter Facility, a 280 acre Receiver Facility, a 200 acre Security Group Facility, A TSC-54 Satellite Terminal, 3 Fleet Satellite Terminals, an Ascomm van and more than 20 high






FLASH FROM T SITE

All in all we had a great time. And we are all looking forward to next season. Look out everyone! T site's on the road and radiating!




R SITE AND THEIR FANS by RM2 HAYS & RMSA MORALES


MAKING PROGRESS by RM1 Joe Maciel

NEW EARTH TERMINAL COMING TO NCS! by ET3 Kevin Keating

Due to the ever increasing roll that satellite communications play in the Defense Communication System satellite communications at NAVCOMMSTA Diego Garcia will be undergoing some radical changes in the months ahead. These changes will be in the form of the installation of a new earth terminal at R site.

The new earth terminal, a GSC-39, will be replacing a quite old TSC-54 earth terminal. The TSC-54 with it's distinctive 4 feedhorn, cloverleaf shaped antenna dish design, will remain on line up and through testing and acceptance of the new earth terminal. The installation of this multimillion dollar project is expected to begin in January and should be completed in 2 to 3 months time.


In addition to the earth terminal, roughly 20 racks of new Digital Communication Sub-system (DCSS) Equipment will also be installed. Very basically, the DCSS Digitally conditions and modulates the user circuits from the Tech Control Facility for input to the earth terminal. Though not actually part of the earth terminal, the DCSS must be considered an intergral part

for successful operation of the earth terminal.


Once the GSC-39 is fully operational and has taken over all satellite communications, the TSC-54 will come down and be returned to the U.S. Army.

One would think a terminal as old as this one would be allowed to collect dust somewhere. But this is not to happen. Due to great technical skill past and present, and not to mention alot of NCS Diego Garcia dollars, the Army decided rather than retire it, it is going to continue to maintain it as an operational earth terminal stateside. (BZ guys!)

CTO3 TROTTER: Give President Regan a back


