A year on Diego Garcia! What is it like? Water hours, four to eight weeks in an unairconditioned seahut, ten to sixteen weeks in airconditioned seahuts, community showers and heads, no telephone service, national news and sporting events presented two weeks after the fact, four people berthed in an area designated for three (or less), hot food unavailable at work sites, long lines at the ship's store, nonavailability of basic uniform items, coral reef attacks, overcrowded work spaces, three section watch posture and family separation! These were the negative items at the NAVCOMMSTA a year ago; yet "It don't get no better than this!" were the buzz words. It got better. Major



equipment upgrades have been completed at R and C sites, all NAVCOMMSTA personnel are berthed in a brand new "barracks", forty new fresh water wells have been placed into service, a recreation center has been opened at the plantation, worldwide commercial telephone service is available, real-time television is available, a modern air terminal has been opened, a new CPO club has been opened, one mile jogging trail has opened, food service facilities at the clubs have been expanded, and a four section watchbill was recently implemented. In the near future a new enlisted dining facility will be opened, a banking facility will be available, the new power plant will be placed into service, new enlisted and officer quarters will be opened, the coral roads in the downtown area will covered with asphalt, and a number of other improvements will be accomplished which will improve the lifestyle of Fantasy Island residents.




Petty Officer and Sailor of the Quarter


XO Comments ... LCDR S.F. Snell





CTR2 Cavanagh reenlists on USS Texas

On Thursday, 19 May 1983, a reenlistment ceremony was held on the signal bridge aboard the U.S.S. Texas, CGN-39 during its visit to Diego Garcia, BIOT. Cryptologic Technician (Collection) Second Class Mary E. Cavanagh of 23 Division was reenlisted for a period of six years by Richard M. Gilbert, LT, MC. Being the first female to be reenlisted aboard the nuclear powered cruiser, Petty Officer Cavanagh was presented a certificate from the Commanding Officer of the U.S.S. Texas, Captain W.D. Andress Jr. making her an honorary crew member of the Texas. Petty Officer Cavanagh first enlisted in the U.S. Navy in March of 1977, and attended recruit training in Orlando, Florida. Upon completion of boot camp, she went to Pensacola, Florida for CTR class "A" school and graduated in February 1978. Following "A" school, Petty Officer Cavanagh was ordered to NAVCOMMSTA Rota, Spain where she worked at NCO Mediterranean HFDF Net.

March 1980, she received orders to Ft. George G. Meade and worked at NSOC with A24 Group. After a two year tour there, she attended analysis and reporting school at Goodfellow AFB, Texas before receiving orders to NAVCOMMSTA Diego Garcia. 






Right: Newly appointed LCDR Mcdonald is welcomed aboard at C-Site after the ceremony frocking him to his present rank.








LCDR ISRAEL INSPECTS NCS

Career Planning.....RM1 Gonzales

How many times have you heard Diego Garcia referred to as Type 3 duty? What does this mean and how does this Type 3 duty fit into your Navy career.

The definition given below to Type 3 duty is taken from Chapter 3 of the TRANSMAN:

"Overseas Shore Duty (Sea/Shore Code 3) - Duty performed in overseas land based activities (including Alaska and Hawaii) at locations where the prescribed DOD accompanied tour length is less than 36 months. Duty is credited as sea duty for rotational purposes. For women, Type 3 duty is considered OUTUS.

All ratings in the Navy are required to serve tour lengths of differing duration according to the manning levels of each rating. These tour lengths are also listed in Chapter 3 of the TRANSMAN. The list is revised annually, and should be reviewed by each person to determine their own tour length, so that he/she may in turn plan their future orders accordingly.

For example, determining how much more sea/shore (CONUS/OUTUS) duty you have remaining will help you determine where or what you would like your next assignment to be. This knowledge will enable you to negotiate with your detailer

for orders with a clearer understanding of the duty types available.

Chapter 4 of the TRANSMAN provides a listing of other overseas duty (types 3, 4, and 6). Chapter 25 provides a listing of all the Duty Preference Codes by locale, homeport, duty/activity, type, and ship codes. Also, a complete list of school course codes and their locations are available.

You may discover that, while Type 3 duty is demanding due to its isolation, it also enables you to negotiate favorably with the detailer for future orders. Of course, the bottom line is assignments will be in accordance with the needs of the Navy, but there is a genuine effort to match the Navy's needs with those of the servicemember.

You owe it to yourself to find out about the various duty preferences available to you. Contact your Career Counselor.






