As we face the challenges ahead, I am confident that these same characteristics will make my tour both successful and highly enjoyable.




## Petty Officer and Sailor of the Quarter


### XO Comments...LCDR S.F. Snell








### NCS CHANGE OF COMMAND





### **Career Information**

Since reporting aboard Fantasy Island in early July and subsequently assuming the duties of Department Career Counselor, I have been delightfully pleased at the numbers of people taking an active interest in their career pipeline. Many first-term personnel enter my office, however, and request duty which is not in congruence with prescribed tour rotation. Some guidance to follow before submitting your duty preference sheet is as follows:

- a. Tour rotation for CT's assigned to Diego Garcia (CTT,M,O,& R) is two consecutive OUTUS tours to one CONUS tour. At times, tour rotation breaks are granted on a case-by-case basis. This is the exception, however, and not the rule.
- b. CTA branch personnel assigned to Diego Garcia realize a one in-one out tour rotation. Many individuals in all branches elect to remain overseas.
- c. If considering a career in the Navy, take a good long look at the job, not just the location. Many of our remote sites offer an individual duties and responsibilities which reach far beyond the scope of his/her paygrade. This will not only help you progress more rapidly, it plays an important role before selection boards.
- d. Work through your Division Career Counselor. Each of my retention assistants have years of experience in many facets of their particular rating as well as in different locations throughout the world. He/she may steer you in a career direction that you had not previously given much thought. Additionally, you may have thoughts on going to Germany, Scotland, Japan, etc., but really don't know very much about the country. Again, your divisional career counselor may have spent a tour there, or can put you in touch with someone in your division who has, and can provide valuable insight on a prospective tour of duty.
- e. Finally, don't be swayed by the opinions of others when selecting your duty preferences. What may have been a "bad" tour for one person may have underlying reasons which had actually nothing to do with the tour itself. Personally speaking, some of the worst things I had heard about Diego Garcia upon receiving orders were from individuals who had never been here. To me and many, many others on "The Rock", Diego Garcia is an adventure, fun in the sun, and all the other things we on the island sport as slogans on our T-shirts (Well, almost all the other things!!!).

My door is always open, the coffee's hot, and the information binders are at my fingertips. This is my first tour of career counseling, and each time an individual enters my office I find that I too, learn a little more.

#### GUARD III

The <u>Guaranteed Assignment</u> <u>Retention Detailing Program</u> (GUARD III) is one of the most misunderstood programs in the Navy's retention effort. Many people think that any duty they desire can be obtained through reenlistment under the auspices of GUARD III. This is not so. From the Retention Team Manual come the following facts:

- a. The first guaranteed assignment is used during the first enlistment the second can be used anytime up to the twenty-fifth year of service;
  - b. May not be under PCS orders at time of application;

had the opportunity to spend a few hours of our break with Resusci Annie when we were qualifying in CPR. We are going to start taking her to the beach so she can catch a few rays.



WASHINGTON (NES)...The Naval Military Personnel Command has announced changes to policies governing transfer to the Fleet Reserve. In the interest of increasing stability and continuity within commands, and to conserve scarce permanent change of station funds, the following policy changes have been made:

- Individuals who are otherwise eligible must now serve two years onboard their present permanent duty station at time of transfer to the Fleet Reserve. Previously, a minimum of one year onboard was required. An exception to this policy will be for Navy people who submit requests for transfer to the Fleet Reserve within 30 days of receipt of PCS orders; those people will be required to serve in their new duty station for a period of one year. 




### Letting Go J.A.Brown


All that's left is the forgetting, the final letting go.


In preparation for the upcoming season, SI welcomes all people to come and join our motley group. Feel free to come and play or join the SI fan club by just watching and having an enjoyable time.



<sup>-</sup> Individuals may extend up to six months beyond their projected rotation date at their current duty station in order to complete 20 years of creditable active service for Fleet Reserve eligibility. Previously, a three-month extension was allowed to complete 20 years of creditable active service.

Navy people already in receipt of approved Fleet Reserve transfer dates will not be affected. Additionally, all requests for transfer to the Fleet Reserve submitted to NMPC before Sept 30, 1983, will not be affected by the policy change.



- c. Be within six months of EAOS as extended;
- d. Be eligible for duty requested IAW sea/shore or OUTUS/CONUS rotation pattern established in TRANSMAN;
  - e. Be willing to reenlist for four or more years;
  - f. Have consistent record of above-average performance;
  - g. Be recommended by your Commanding Officer.

Those are just a few of the eligibility requirements for GUARD III applicants. Specific requirements may be obtained from your Career Counselor.


