

#### LEST WE FORGET

Since the end of the Vietnam War, a recognition day has been set aside for more than 2400 Americans who were prisoners of war or missing in action in Southeast Asia. Working with our government, families of these Americans have tried in many ways to find their loved ones.

A presidential emissary for POW/MIA affairs was selected in August 1987. Since then, some progress has been made in accounting for the vast number of POW/MIA's. On three occasions, remains of American servicemen were returned. Navy men were positively identified in two out of the three occasions.

All Navy bases are now flying the POW/MIA flag along with the national ensign on Veterans Day, Memorial Day, and the National POW/MIA Recognition Day. This exemplifies awareness of the missing, their families, and those who deal with the Indo-Chinese governments to account for these missing Americans.





# CIVILIAN SPOTLIGHT



After leaving Acadia Park, you enter Birch Harbor via East Schoodic Road where Edison and Letitia Church have resided for many years. Life-long residents of Maine, Edison lived in Birch Harbor most of his life, while Letitia grew up in Prospect Harbor. They have five children and three grandchildren.

Twenty-five years ago Edison hired as a gate guard. It was 1963 and stood watch alone: guards Ouarterdeck was located in the Apartment Building at the time. After two years, Edison became an equipment operator after which he was made a working foreman of the Transportation Department. Since he plowed snow and handled heavy equipment prior to his position here, Edison was already well acquainted with the various aspects of his job. He not only supervises but also assists Adin Reed and Birchard Church, his brother, in their tasks as mechanic and equipment Adin says that Edison is operator. always willing to help any way he can. 

Edison said, "During particularly bad storms, the waves would hit the seawall and splash over my truck," and then adds, "There is nothing so eerie as being alone on Schoodic Point during a storm of this intensity."

Edison likes working in his vegetable garden and planting flowers, especially sweet peas. He plants peas, carrots, beans, corn, beets and many other vegetables. Each year for Halloween, he raises a crop of pumpkins for the neighborhood children.

When he retires, he is looking forward to setting up a permanent place to enjoy wood-working, one of his favorite hobbies. He also likes to walk through the woods exploring the wild vegetation found there.









## IN THE WORKS - BEQ ADDITION

On 10 May, the contract to add fortyfour rooms to the Bachelor's Enlisted Quarters was awarded. The official groundbreaking ceremony took place on the drizzly morning of May 26 with Captain Stevens, the former CO who initiated the project in 1983, and Captain Whiton performing the official duties. According to the present schedule, the project will be completed by 20 May 1989 at an estimated cost of \$1,093,552. Prime contractor is E. L. Shea of Ellsworth. Subcontractors are Elco Electric, Maine Energy, and Paul Martin Inc.

Lately, it's been difficult to move anywhere on base without encountering some kind of construction—a true sign of progress as we wrap up several projects. The Religious Education Center was completed in late May and we are looking forward to the ribbon cutting ceremony in August after Public Works finishes renovating the Community Center. The new PW Center is complete and Public Works moved into it in late July. Let's hope that the BEQ addition progresses as smoothly as these projects did. Meanwhile, thank you for your continued patience.

## MORE ABOUT DOWN EAST

Fishing has been one of the main occupations for native Downeasters. Lobster traps, scallop drags and trawl lines are some types of fishing gear used on a fishing boat. Frankie Jordan, a Maine fisherman residing in Winter Harbor with his wife Linda, works on all three. With all this equipment, Frankie requires assistance from his dependable stern man, Ernie Spaulding.

Frankie has fished for thirty-seven years, most of his life except for a four-year stint in the Navy. In his youth, he helped his father and another lobsterman, fishing from a small 12-foot skiff. Frankie now owns a thirty-seven foot reinforced plastic lobster boat which he had built seventeen years ago. It was one of the first of its type in the area. Due to good care, this boat (named Linda Diane for his wife) has survived rough ocean trips.

In January and February, Ernie dives for scallops (sometimes 100 feet down). During the summer Frankie fishes three to four miles offshore, while in the winter he goes 18 to 20 miles out (brrr). This usually takes 1-1/2 hours one way per day. Heat on the boat is supplied from the engine and a water vat warms his hands. Fishing the ocean requires knowledge about depth, rock ledges and tides. In winter, he leaves about 0400 and returns at 1700-1800, and in summer he leaves about 0530 and returns about the same time. It's a long day of grueling work.


Frankie built wooden traps, but he is now switching over to wire frames. once fished with him thoroughly enjoyed it. Now, Ernie baits the bags, empties traps, and lobster claws; he also paints buoys and repairs gear and lobster traps. Frankie has approximately 600 traps with blaze orange, yellow spindle buoys to mark them. After Ernie puts the lobster bait in the bait bags, he ties them to the center of the trap's netting. Attracted to the bait, the lobster enters the trap and is unable to back out of Lobsters less than 3-7/32" from eye socket to beginning of tail must be tossed back to the sea.



Marine life other than lobster are also found in these traps, such as crabs, urchins, starfish, and occasionally, even a seal. Seals love lobster and are a natural enemy to the lobster fisherman. Frankie also carries four drags for scallops and has a trawl line with hooks, bait, buoys and anchor attached to hook halibut, hake, cod and other fish.

Recently, Frankie and Linda started a small business selling his catch. When Linda receives an order for fish, she notifies Frankie by two-way radio; he tries to bring in what is ordered. They supply the freshest fish available.

If they are successful in their new business adventure (and we hope they will be), it would certainly be to everyone's advantage. There is nothing like feasting on the "catch of the day."

Sounds like a busy bunch of people doesn't it! They are never TOO busy, and they are always very happy to help anyone who comes through the doors.







#### SAFETY SENSE

People in small boats face many hazards while boating in cold water. Should they fall in, they could suffer shock to the system--panic, hypothermia or drowning.

The shock a person experiences by falling suddenly into the water can cause cold-inspired gasping. People who have gone into a cold shower may remember the automatic gasp for air they experienced when hit in the chest with cold water. This is called the "torso reflex." If the mouth is under water when this gasp occurs, drowning is probable.

If you know you are about to fall into the water, the Safety Council advises you to cover your face with your hands and hold your breath.

Hypothermia, another hazard for cold water boaters, is thought to be responsible for half of all boating deaths. It may be responsible for an even larger percentage in this area because the water is cold all year long. Cold water chills 25 times faster than cold air. To minimize the effects of hypothermia, a person should immediately attempt to get back into the boat or climb onto an

overturned boat. Clothing should not be removed--even wet clothing will hold in some body heat.

If you are in the water and you can get back in or on the boat, but you are wearing a life jacket, you should assume the Heat Escape Lessening Position (H.E.L.P.). The arms are crossed over the chest, ankles crossed, knees drawn to the chest, hands kept high on the should or neck. If the hands are kept out of the water, they will stay warmer and more flexible.

People who use small boats in cold water should always wear a well-fitted life-jacket; it offers both flotation and some protection against hypothermia.


#### Crocodile Dundee II
